Weave Threads of Love Rev. Charissa Suli (UCA Assembly President)





As President of the Uniting Church in Australia, my theme for these three years is: "Threads of Love – Weaving Christ's Love Across Cultures and Boundaries."


This theme captures what I see and hear as I travel among our communities: Christ at work across difference, drawing us together in hope. Year A of the Revised Common Lectionary (The bible readings plan for the next Christian year that begins with advent) invites us into that same story as we walk alongside Jesus through the Gospel of Matthew.

Matthew's account speaks directly to communities seeking to live faithfully in complex times. It is a gospel rooted in Scripture and tradition, yet radically open to the new work of God in Christ. Written for a diverse and often pressured community, Matthew weaves together a story of Jesus as Emmanuel – "God with us" – from his birth to the promise of his abiding presence at the close of the age.

This year we will hear the voice of Jesus the Teacher. Matthew frames Jesus' ministry around five great discourses, echoing the five books of Moses. In these we encounter the Sermon on the Mount with its call to a deeper righteousness; parables of the kingdom that reveal God's upside-down reign; instructions for life together as disciples; and visions of judgment and hope for the nations. Matthew continually invites us to see not only what Jesus does but what it means to follow him: to embody mercy, humility, justice and courage in our own context.

We also hear Matthew's deep concern for the community of faith. This gospel was written for a church learning how to live as Christ's body – struggling with persecution, diversity and change, yet called to bold witness. Matthew names the reality of conflict, but also offers practical teaching for forgiveness, reconciliation and leadership that serves. In a time when our own communities wrestle with similar challenges, these texts ground us again in the transforming presence of Christ.

This bible reading in the year ahead invites us to weave these same threads of love in our worship, witness and daily life. It draws our eyes to Jesus who fulfils the law and prophets, who heals and feeds, who calls us to pray "Your kingdom come."




May this journey through Matthew renew our discipleship, open our lives more fully to the Spirit, and draw us closer to Emmanuel who makes us one.





Can we handle the truth?

Christians for Yoorrook by Dr. James Thom (Brunswick UCA)

The Yoorrook Justice Commission was a groundbreaking project in truth telling led by First Peoples, and its final report and recommendations were tabled in State Parliament on 1st July 2025. On Saturday 18th October 2025, I was one of three members of Brunswick Uniting Church that attended an event run by Christians for Yoorrook (in Father Tuckers Meeting Room at the rear of the Brotherhood of St Laurence in Fitzroy) to examine how the different churches might respond to the Yoorrook recommendations and what land justice might look like.

In the morning, the first speaker was the distinguished Indigenous
Theologian Aunty Professor Anne Pattel-Grey from the University of
Queensland. She spoke about systemic racism as well as her personal



experiences of racism. She emphasised the need for Christ's Allyship and what it looked like. Then, Professor Mark Brett, a non-indigenous theologian from Whitley College, spoke on how the churches should respond to Yoorrook.

After lunch, we then heard from representatives of the Anglican and Uniting Churches. Bishop Genevieve Blackwell, who testified before the Yoorrook Justice Commission on behalf of the Anglican diocese of Melbourne and Dr Mark Zirnsak, who (with Tim Molineux) did much of the work preparing the written submissions to the Yoorrook Justice Commission on behalf the Uniting Church. What emerged from the these two presentations was the apparent differences in legal advice about the property trusts that Uniting and Anglican churches have received - Uniting lawyers seemed very cautious about property trusts whereas the Anglican legal advice seemed more open to the church being able to transfer property to (for example), local first nations groups. The meeting closed with a communal liturgical response to Yoorook led by Rev Associate Professor Robyn Whitaker from Pilgrim College.

In responding to the Yoorrook recommendation, the church needs to act, but it needs to first do the work that will bring people in congregations along with the Synod.

This hearing lasted over 3 hours, so you might want to allow more than one session to watch it!

Included in the 100 recommendations from the Yoorrook Justice Commission is recommendation number 19, which is directed at the Churches in Victoria:

Consistent with their commitments to First Peoples, Churches should identify, as a priority, opportunities within the State of Victoria to:

- (a) Return land acquired for little or no consideration, or reserved by the Crown or Governor for Church purposes, to Traditional Owners of that land; and
- (b) Share a portion of proceeds from the future sale of land of the nature described in (a) with Traditional Owners of that land (irrespective of whether it is subject to the State Aid to Religion Abolition Act 1871 (Vic)).

The recent meeting of the Synod of Victoria and Tasmania of the Uniting Church instructed the Synod Standing Committee to setup a working group to respond to this recommendation. According to the former moderator, Rev David Fotheringham, as quoted in *Crosslight*, "The Synod has identified 127 properties currently held by the Church for which land was granted by the Crown in this manner, besides properties that had previously been sold. Approximately 10 per cent of Uniting Churches in Victoria have been built on land granted by the Crown."

Unit Description

This unit equips you to tell histories of the land on which your congregation lives and worships.

It focuses on seeking understanding and on respecting Country. It examines the deep history of First Nations peoples, the recent history of colonial settlement, congregational history writing, and the challenges and hopes for the contemporary church on Aboriginal land.

You will be introduced to methods of historical research and the skills you need to interpret legal, theological, and local historical sources.

This unit walks with you as you research, write and reflect on the legacies of the past in the present.

Students will attend in-person or online in real time at 7 pm – 9 pm on Thurs 26 Feb (Northey Lecture), 9.30 am – 5 pm on 27 – 28 Feb, 27 – 28 March and 22 May, and an online evening workshop 29 April.

Covenanting Pathways Toolkit:

A resource exploring how to practice Covenanting in Victoria

Covenanting is a special call to all Uniting Church members to form meaningful relationships between First and Second peoples based on truth-telling, justice, equality and mutual understanding.

This <u>Covenanting Pathways Toolkit</u> and its supporting resources were designed for a Victorian and Tasmanian context to explore contemporary pathways to connect, or re-connect with Covenanting. You could do things like participating in one of the listed 'Walking on Country' tours, or attending an event run by one of the many First Nation led organisations across Victoria and Tasmania.

Use this Toolkit to get access to resources to better understand where opportunities exist to connect with First People Communities in Victoria and Tasmania. Or, perhaps use it to go deeper into your own understanding of the Uniting Church practices that inform how Covenanting is embedded in the life of the church. Accompanying this toolkit are supporting resources in the form of four additional FAQs, and a cultural calendar that are accessible below.

- ⇒ Start a 'Covenanting Group' or a 'Reading Group' in your congregation or faith Community
- ⇒ Church Councils can consider Covenanting in their congregation
- ⇒ UCAF groups could arrange a Traditional Owner organisation to make a visit and talk on their personal experiences
- ⇒ Prayer Groups could pray for respect of country, reconciliation and healing
