## Ashes to Ashes, Dust to Dust

***Ashes to Ashes: We acknowledge that large areas of our presbyteries have been threatened by grass and bushfires.***

I spent my summer holidays at Halls Gap, where we have our home, and where they are recovering after two past years of bushfires. We were listening to the very mixed messages about how they are recovering. Some say business this year has been good. Others did not even bother opening on the 'catastrophic' days. Some accommodation will earn no money this summer because they are honour last years bookings. Market stall owners are saying it attendance is mixed and unpredictable; great one week not a person in sight the next.

Soon we were covered in smoke again as the westerly breezes told of fires at Grass Flat, Natimuk, Quantong and Haven. My husband and I travelled into Horsham for worship to hear some first hand stories of evacuation, Evacuation Centres and crisis accommodation. Stories of CFA surrounding the Natimuk Nursing Homes, protecting residents, as their own homes were threatened. It was a time of confusion as the electricity was out, the mobiles went flat, and people were unable to speak to their family members.

Returning to Hall's Gap we knew that we were cut off from home in Geelong, by the Skipton, Carranballac and Streatham fire and the Meredith fires and Lorne fires.

Two weeks later we are back in Geelong, the westerly blew and we were covered by smoke again, as Lorne fires continue and the Colac fires begin.

***Dust to Flood: We acknowledge the extreme heat wave across our State and the flooding Lorne.***

A heat wave has hit the state with many days above 40 degrees. Everyone sought refuge inside seeking respite from the blasted sun. But somehow there were rain deluges so heavy it caused flash flooding and the closure of the Great Ocean Road. The low lands were flooded, hundreds were evacuated, several rescued from roof tops or washed out to sea. The Lorne township was divided by floodwaters.

As an Australian, [Ash Wednesday](#) and bushfires have always gone together. Why do we bother to rub ashes on our forehead, when bushfire soot covers our hands and faces and houses. Why bother repenting when we are already lamenting. Yes we remember that we are dust and to dust we shall return!

***"Earth to Earth, Ashes to Ashes, dust to dust..."*** are word in the UCA funeral liturgy often quoted by TV funeral scene. But it is the next few words that are some of the most powerful words to recall to those experiencing loss and are grieving ***"... In sure and certain hope in the resurrection to eternal life, through our Lord Jesus Christ who died, was buried, and rose again for us."*** To those who are grieving, hope is sure and certain for by Jesus' grace, we are saved in faith!

## How to hold the perfect Pancake Day event.



### Choose your date and location

Pancake Day is on Shrove Tuesday, but you can hold your event any time until the end of April. Great places to host your Pancake Day event include parks, schools, churches, workplaces, cafes and shopping centres, sporting clubs or even at home.

### Get creative and have fun

- Hold a pancake tossing competition
- Hold a pancake decorating competition
- Have a pancake flipping race
- Invite a local celebrity
- Partner with a local business and ask them to match the money you raise dollar for dollar.

### Recruit volunteers

Many hands make light work! Get your co-workers, church members, friends, family and your local community to help out at your event!

### Get noticed

Promote your event in your local community; resources are available including a [media release](#) and [posters](#) to help promote your event.

Social media is also a great way to promote your event. We have a range of [social media tiles](#) available to download.

### Look the part

- Deck out your venue with Pancake Day posters, use black and yellow streamers, black or yellow tablecloths etc
- Wear your brightest yellow outfit, pop on your name badge and get flipping
- Be sure the chef wears the Pancake Day apron supplied with your kit.

### Hold your event

- Prepare your pancake mix 30 minutes before you start cooking – this makes yummiier pancakes
- We recommend selling pancakes for \$5 each, it is up to you if you would like to charge more for toppings
- You could even do a deal of \$8 for two pancakes.

\* Everyone holding a registered Pancake Day event to raise funds for Uniting is exempt from charging GST on the sale of pancakes.

### Submit the funds you've raised

Complete your [Funds Submission Form](#) and send it back to us in the pre-paid envelope provided, or donate the funds raised online. Each event coordinator received a unique Pancake Day Fundraiser ID number on their Authority to Fundraise letter. We ask that you use this as your reference when depositing funds so we know who the deposit has come from and we can receipt you accordingly.

# Transfiguration Sunday

**How to take a family activity sheets and turn it into an inspiring creative worship. Create worship station around your worship space.**

## Write

Make an acrostic. Write the word 'AWESOME' vertically down a piece of paper. Set a 60-second timer and see how many adjectives you can think of to describe something 'awesome' starting with those letters. Place this near your front door to remind you of God's awesome presence in the world.

Put a whiteboard & pens against the wall in the church and write the word "AWESOME" across the top. Congregational members are asked to contribute their own acrostic words that best fit the bible reading.

## Living Scripture

'We had been eyewitnesses of his majesty.' 2 Peter 1:16

What events have you personally witnessed? Perhaps an epic sporting victory, a wedding, a birth, a crime, a miracle? Seeing these things can change our expectations of the future (it could happen again).

Peter tells us he was an eyewitness to seeing Jesus in his glory on the mountain of transfiguration. That encounter changed how he saw Jesus, and how he understood the future.

What encounters have you had with God? Has God met with you, encouraged you, called you or nudged you somehow? How did those moments change you? Who do you wish could experience more of Jesus? (It might be you.) Pray for that person today.

## Pray

God of good news,  
for eyewitnesses who share,  
for all who were there:  
**we praise you.**  
for your living word your loving heart,  
that calls us all to play our part:  
**we praise you.**  
We thank you that you are here now,  
our awesome God... take a bow  
**as we praise you.**  
Amen.



If I lead a creative worship I have one stationary idea for people who do not like to move during worship. Put these words (Commentary Notes) and questions on the overhead screen as a think piece. And they are invited to reflect on the questions. They may even talk to the person next to them and share ideas and stories.

Put this prayer next to a sand tray and tapers and invite people to light a candle for a miraculous events in your life!

## First impressions

- How important is it to see things with your own eyes?
- In what ways have you experienced God's presence?
- How might you describe these experiences to someone who is sceptical about faith?



Put these question on some butchers paper on the communion table with some post it notes... People add their answers to these questions that they are happy to share. These can be read out to the congregation at later and serve as a witness of worshippers.

Decorate an old cardboard box and turn it into a memory box. You could write words to describe your family on the outside or even print off photos to stick onto it. Fill it with photos, stories and objects that remind you of important memories and people. Thank God for them and pray for them as you fill the box. Alternatively, you could decorate a notebook instead to fill with memories.



Decorate a box and take it home fill. Every time you feel God has answered your prayers write a note to remind yourself perhaps with a photos of who the prayer involved. You could include your friends stories too.

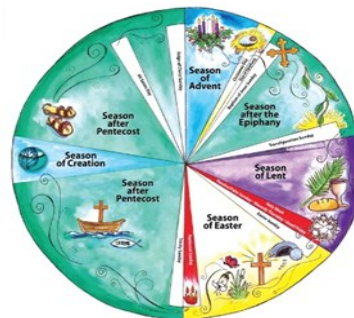

FUNDS TO ASSIST YOUR CONGREGATION OR FAITH COMMUNITY REDUCE EMISSIONS - In 2024 a Synod **Emissions Reduction Fund (SERF)** was made available by the Synod of Victoria and Tasmania and many congregations applied and were granted funding to assist with their work in reducing their emissions.

There is now a further opportunity for congregations and faith communities to apply for another round of funding.

Your congregation or faith community is invited to make an application to this fund in order to assist your congregation's work towards reaching zero emissions.

Applications close 5 pm on February 28th 2026.

The 2025-2030 strategic plan has four focus points that informs the ongoing work of the College.

### 1. Learning and teaching for intercultural church

**2. Liberative and contextual theologies** - providing leadership in prioritising and learning from liberative and contextual theologies, as we acknowledge our location on stolen land. Creating space for generous dialogue and amplifying diverse perspectives, taking seriously the breadth of human experience and the need to pursue justice.

In 2026 we are offering a new subject: "Respecting Country: Deep history, the colonies, and the church", a unit that equips you to tell histories of the land on which your congregation lives and worships. [See page 15.](#)

**3. Equipping the whole people of God** - expanding the scope of the College's work to equip the whole people of God for changing contexts for ministry, mission and discipleship.

This Course guide reflects the growing scope of educational and formation opportunities being offered or promoted by Pilgrim. See the online Uniting Learning courses ([see pages 29 and 30](#)) that are designed for lay leaders and ministry staff. Once again we're introducing new professional development options for people serving in ministry, lay or ordained. We've included here the opportunities for clinical pastoral education, training in professional supervision, and leadership development, many offered in collaboration with other colleges and training groups.

**4. Life-giving community** - fostering an exemplary, flourishing, collaborative college community in which students and staff feel valued and empowered, supported by a healthy governance and management environment.

The quality of education is shaped by our experience in the classroom, in online tutorials, in the library, in the café, and in the one-on-one conversations with lecturers, facilitators and supervisors.

## JOURNEYING TOGETHER FOR THE COMMON GOOD

Centre for Ministry North Parramatta      25-27 February

In 2022, the 16th Assembly (Reconvened) requested the ASC to set up a task group to aid the national Church in bringing together the work happening in many parts of the Church and achieving our goal of net zero emissions by 2040. The Net Zero Steering Committee has since that time been drawing together experts and those working in this field from across the life of the Church, to share stories, compare and align approaches, develop tools and attempt to learn from the wisdom of First Peoples.

The Net Zero Steering Committee has hosted a number of roundtables (with another coming later this year - details to come!) and set up some specific sub-groups focusing on Measuring Emissions, Exploring Carbon Offsets, Learning from First People’s Wisdom, Climate Champions and Practical Steps in Congregations.

Arising from the Climate Champions group, and driven by excellent work in the NSW-ACT Synod, there will be a training event held in Sydney in late February. Called **Vaka 2026**, this event will enable our Church leaders to be upskilled in community organising to enable advocacy and action related to Climate Change.

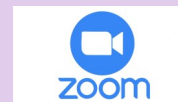
